





International Standards

Convention on the Rights of the Child

Right to maintain personal relations and direct contact

Right to have their best interests taken into account as a primary consideration







Best Interests

To be taken into account in all decisions by all parts of the criminal justice system which impact upon the child (e.g. arrest, remand, sentencing, access and contact)

Balancing exercise: individualized assessment of best interests of the child in question



Children of incarcerated parents (not only children of incarcerated mothers)







International Guidance

The right to maintain a relationship for children separated from incarcerated parent:

- Regular visits
- Child friendly visits
- Extended visits
- Detention close to home
- Contact through phone and video conferencing
- Ban on prohibition of family contact as a disciplinary measure

International Guidance

Guidance drawn from across the UN includes:

- training for all who come into contact with children of incarcerated parents


Best Interests

Specific Recommendations for Switzerland



Committee on the Rights of the Child

With reference to the Committee's recommendations during its day of general discussion in 2011 on the "Rights of Children of Incarcerated Parents", the Committee recommends that the State party collect data and undertake a study on the situation regarding the situation of children with parents in prison in the State party, with a view to ensuring personal relations between children and their parents, including regular visits, adequate services and appropriate support in line with article 9 of the Convention, and that the best interests of the child is a primary consideration in all decisions taken.


Specific Recommendations for Switzerland
